**Summary of Legislation**

Under current law, a person who possesses a concealed handgun permit or a temporary emergency concealed handgun permit must renew the permit with the county sheriff who originally issued it. This bill allows a permit holder to renew a non-temporary permit with the sheriff in the location in which her or she resides, maintains a secondary residence, or owns or leases property for business purposes. The bill also allows a permit holder to renew a temporary permit with the sheriff in the location in which he or she resides or in which the circumstances giving rise to the emergency exist.

Under the bill, in order to renew a permit in a new location, the applicant must submit a legible photocopy of the permit with his or her renewal application. In addition, the renewing sheriff must contact the office of the sheriff who originally issued the permit and confirm that it has not been revoked or suspended.

**Local Government Impact**

The bill expands the locations in which a person may renew a concealed handgun permit. This change is not expected to affect the number of permits renewed. Therefore, the bill is assessed as having no impact on state revenue or expenditures.

The bill will increase workload for county sheriffs to verify that a person is eligible to renew his or her concealed handgun permit. The bill will also reallocate the funds paid to county sheriffs to renew a permit. Currently, individuals who apply to renew a concealed carry permit pay a fee of no more than \$50 to the county sheriff to cover any administrative costs associated with the renewal. Individuals who apply for a temporary emergency permit pay a fee of no more than \$25 to the county sheriff. By expanding the counties in which a person may renew a permit, the bill is expected to reduce fee revenue for some sheriffs' offices and increase it for others. The reallocation of revenue has not been estimated.

**Effective Date**

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.
