

## CHAPP Grantees funded for State Fiscal Year 2012-2013

- 1. Grantee:** Boulder County AIDS Project (BCAP)  
**Project Title:** Atlas: HIV Prevention Education for Men Who Have Sex with Men (MSM)

**Key Objectives:** 906 persons will be targeted during the first year of this project.

- Atlas will refine the HIV-related knowledge and outreach education skills of Popular Opinion Leaders (POLs)
- Atlas core group members will work with community partners serving MSM and will provide HIV awareness and distribute risk reduction resources at a minimum of eight community events
- Atlas core group members will develop plans for community outreach event(s)
- Atlas will provide HIV antibody testing and counseling to MSM

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

### Request Summary

- **Strategies:** This project will implement aspects of the proven behavioral interventions, Mpowerment; Popular Opinion Leader (POL); Many Men, Many Voices (MMMV), and Community PROMISE. Personalized Cognitive Counseling (PCC) is used as a component of Counseling, Testing, and Referral Services (CTRS).
- **FTE Involved:** 0.7 FTE
- **Target Population:** Men Who Have Sex with Men (MSM)
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban and Rural (Boulder, Broomfield, Gilpin, Clear Creek Counties)

- 2. Grantee:** Brother Jeff's Cultural Center  
**Project Title:** Five Points HIV Prevention Grassroots Initiative

**Key Objectives:** Peer educators will conduct 300 one-on-one discussions on safer sex and injection drug practices to at-risk individuals. Peer educators will reach 150 individuals through safer sex educational groups, and will offer at least 250 individuals HIV testing and other HIV prevention support services.

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

### Request Summary

- **Strategies:** The Five Points HIV Prevention Grassroots Initiative is a community mobilization effort designed to reduce HIV risk among African Americans, primarily in the Five Points area of Denver. This intervention is based on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)-approved Real AIDS Prevention Project (RAPP), a community-level intervention.
- **FTE Involved:** 2.70 FTE
- **Target Population:** Injecting Drug Users (IDU) and High-risk heterosexuals (HRH)
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban (Denver County)

3. **Grantee:** Children’s Hospital  
**Project Title:** ReACTion: HIV Prevention Collaborative for Vulnerable Youth

**Key Objectives:** This project is comprised of small group and individual prevention work with vulnerable youth aged 13 to 24. The collaborative consists of the Children’s Hospital Immunodeficiency Program (CHIP), Urban Peak, and Prax(us). Rainbow Alley will act as an unfunded partner. The small group and individual prevention work will involve the following curricula per population:

- For street/homeless youth: Street Smart curriculum to 65 youth
- For youth involved in survival sex: use the RESPECT intervention to 30 high-risk youth
- For youth with a history of sexually transmitted infections (STIs): use the OPTIONS intervention for 10 partners of youth living with HIV
- For youth who are adjudicated and/or with a history of STIs: Sex at Six intervention to reach 15 youth

- **FTE Involved:** 1.1 FTE
- **Target Population:** At-risk youth

4. **Grantee:** Colorado Health Network  
**Project Title:** Rural Men Who Have Sex with Men (MSM) HIV Prevention

**Key Objectives:** This project incorporates three previous CHAPP-funded programs serving rural MSM, all of which are based on the Mpowerment intervention.

- Thirty six MSM will receive information on HIV risk behaviors and risk-reduction strategies through a group level intervention (GLI)
- Twenty eight MSM will receive individual level interventions (ILI) on HIV risk reduction, referrals to free HIV testing, and referrals to care, treatment, and case management as needed
- One hundred MSM will participate in social outreach events free of alcohol and drugs

5. **Grantee:** Colorado Health Network  
**Project Title:** State-wide Counseling, Testing, and Referral Services

**Key Objectives:** Conduct Counseling, Testing, and Referral services for up to 300 individuals in the Colorado Health Network's service delivery area, targeting MSM and IDU specifically (excluding the Denver Metro area). Additionally, risk reduction materials will be distributed to at-risk individuals.

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

#### **Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** This is a stand-alone HIV testing application for Colorado AIDS Project – Western (CAP-N) and Colorado AIDS Project – Southern (CAP-S) and strictly for Counseling, Testing, and Referral programming and condom distribution services at Colorado AIDS Project – Northern (CAP-N)
- **FTE Involved:** 1.34 FTE
- **Target Population:** High-Risk IDUs and MSM

6. **Grantee:** Colorado Health Network  
**Project Title:** Rural Injecting Drug User (IDU) Prevention and Denver Syringe Exchange

**Key Objectives:** To provide programming for individuals with a history of injection drug use (IDU) in western and northern Colorado as well as syringe exchange services in the five county Denver metro area. These funds will help to implement and expand Denver Colorado AIDS Project's (DCAP) The Access Program. Funding will help pay for syringes, disposal equipment, and safer injection supplies that will serve clients for a year. This funding also helps to provide staffing that will provide the services and manage the program. Additional funding for the program will be obtained through additional private grants from organizations such as Genentech, The Comer Foundation, and the Syringe Access Fund.

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

#### **Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** Taking it to the Community and Risk Reduction Education are recognized by the Rural Centers for AIDS Prevention as behavioral interventions that can reduce risk behaviors among IDU. Both programs are also recommended by the Colorado HIV Prevention

Advisory Committee (HPAC) as interventions for rural IDU. According to the Health Belief Model, individuals will only change risky behaviors once they are motivated to change. This program incorporates harm reduction techniques and the behavioral stages of change (including relapse) to help IDUs reduce personal risk for HIV, Hepatitis C and STIs.

- **Target Population:** Individuals with a history of injection drug use

7. **Grantee:** Colorado ManREACH  
**Project Title:** Prevention Summits

**Key Objectives:** The program will help reduce HIV/STI transmission and infection rates in rural and urban MSM, rural and urban IDU, and other at-risk populations by providing the resources and outreach that is needed statewide to expand current HIV/STI prevention programs, workshops and activities for these target populations. The Colorado Statewide Prevention Summit project is being expanded to include urban MSM, as well as other populations such as rural and urban IDU who could benefit from more opportunities to access prevention programming and syringe access/exchange services.

8. **Grantee:** Colorado ManREACH  
**Project Title:** ReachOUT 2

**Key Objectives:** REACH Out 2 will use Colorado ManREACH's growing knowledge of the state's rural MSM community, HIV/STI education and prevention, program development and delivery, marketing and business, to further refine the experiences it offers Colorado's rural MSM. It proposes to serve:

- One hundred ninety-five rural MSM at nine events during the 2012 – 2013 CHAPP grant year
- REACH Out 2 will increase the number of rural MSM Colorado ManREACH will serve with CHAPP funds by adding two, three-day events and eliminating one, one-day event from what it offers under the current REACH Out project

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

**Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** The project will offer the group level intervention (GLI), R.A.W (Real Ass World) and other workshops and activities that promote rural MSM health, individuality and community
- **FTE Involved:** .85 FTE
- **Target Population:** Rural MSM
- **Geographical Area Served:** Rural (MSM outside the five Denver Metro counties of Adams, Arapahoe, Denver, Douglas and Jefferson Counties)

9. **Grantee:** Denver Area Youth Services (DAYS)  
**Project Title:** DAYS Prevention Program

**Key Objectives:** The program will use medically accurate HIV and AIDS prevention and education programs based in behavioral and social science theory and research to reach the high risk Latino youth and families. The projects multi-pronged approach includes:

- Providing an eight-week education program (using the acclaimed *¡Cuidate!* curriculum) to at-risk youth at Denver area public schools and community-based agencies serving youth and families
- Providing a Parent Education Workshop (using the promising approach *Raices y Alas* curriculum) to high-risk parents/guardians, with an emphasis on women of color, who care for at-risk youth at Denver area public schools and community-based agencies serving youth and families
- Providing a four-week education program (using the promising approach *Parent-Child Connectedness* curriculum) to high risk youth and their high-risk parent/guardians, with emphasis on women of color, at Denver area public schools and community-based agencies serving youth and families

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

**Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** This program consists of *¡Cuidate!*, *Raices y Alas*, and Parent-Child Connectedness
- **FTE Involved:** 1.5 FTE
- **Target Population:** High-risk youth and high-risk women of color
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban (Denver County)

10. **Grantee:** Greater Denver Interfaith Alliance  
**Project Title:** Project Wholeness

**Key Objectives:** Through the implementation of three evidence-based curricula, this program will:

- Increase the number of African-Americans in Denver who receive HIV/AIDS intervention and prevention classes

- Increase education and awareness on the risk of HIV/AIDS to the African-American community
- Increase the number of African-Americans in Denver who receive HIV/AIDS testing and other community resources and referrals, including HIV testing and STI testing and follow-up services

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

**Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** Utilize the Sisters Informing Sisters on Topics about AIDS (SISTA) curriculum to target African American women. Utilize the Holistic Health Recovery Program (HHRP) to target re-entry populations, and utilize the Focus on Youth with ImPACT (FOY) curriculum for African-American youth aged 12 to 15
- **FTE Involved:** 2.15 FTE
- **Target Population:** High-risk women of color, persons transitioning from incarceration or recently paroled, and high-risk youth
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban (Denver County)

**11. Grantee:** Colorado Non-profit Development Center (CNDC); Harm Reduction Action Center (HRAC)

**Project Title:** Break the Cycle: With a Syringe Exchange Component

**Key Objectives:** Continue to provide the innovative Break the Cycle (BTC) intervention along with offering a syringe access component, allowing HRAC to provide comprehensive services to Denver IDU. The syringe access opportunity will attract new clients to HRAC and incorporate new clients into other services HRAC provides. Outreach for the BTC intervention will happen in two ways: 1) Street outreach in downtown Denver, by passing out health information, BTC class information, and legal harm reduction supplies (no syringes can be distributed in a mobile outreach setting, at this time), and 2) Providing syringe access education and direct service during syringe access hours.

**Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** This project will be based on Break the Cycle
- **FTE Involved:** 1.69 FTE
- **Target Population:** IDU aged 18 and older
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban (Denver, Adams, Arapahoe, and Jefferson Counties)

**12. Grantee:** Hep C Connection

**Project Title:** Continuing the Collaborative: Urban/Rural Partnership Reaching At-risk Populations

**Key Objectives:** This project is a collaborative partnership between Hep C Connection (HCC), Boulder County AIDS Project (BCAP), Colorado AIDS Project – Northern (CAP-N), Colorado AIDS Project – Southern (CAP-S), and Colorado AIDS Project – Western (CAP-W) that

addresses the similar risk factors associated with HIV and hepatitis C virus (HCV) transmission for individuals who are incarcerated or in re-entry facilities.

- Hep C Connection will complete 80 educational presentations for 860 attendees
- Boulder County AIDS Project will deliver 48 educational presentations for 440 attendees
- Colorado AIDS Project – Northern will deliver 60 educational presentations for 520 attendees
- Colorado AIDS Project – Southern will deliver 20 educational presentations for 160 attendees
- Colorado AIDS Project – Western will deliver 12 educational presentations for 60 attendees
- 75 individuals will voluntarily access HIV and/or HCV testing through Hep C Connection (150 total)
  - Target populations to be tested include IDUs, incarcerated individuals, and individuals re-entering society from incarceration

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

### **Request Summary**

**Strategies:** These interventions, rooted in social, behavioral, and biomedical science theories, are group-level interventions (GLI), individual-level interventions (ILI), counseling, testing and referrals, and health education/risk reduction. The proposed collaborative partnership matches the category of “a local adaptation of an evidence-based model” through use of the health belief model, the stages of change model, and the diffusion of innovation model of behavioral theory.

- **FTE Involved:** 4.95 FTE
- **Target Population:** Incarcerated and re-entry populations.
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban and Rural (Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Denver, El Paso, Jefferson, Larimer Mesa and Weld Counties)

**13. Grantee:** Hep C Connection  
**Project Title:** HIV/Hepatitis C “Co-infection” Youth Outreach Project

**Key Objectives:** This project is a collaborative partnership between Hep C Connection), Urban Peak, and Attention Homes to continue to fund the implementation of the Street Smart intervention for at-risk youth. Project activities include:

- The provision of resource materials to at-risk homeless youth
- HIV and/or hepatitis C virus (HCV) testing to 200 at-risk youth
  - Denver: 50 HCV tests
  - Colorado Springs: 100 HIV/HCV tests
  - Boulder: 50 HIV/HCV tests

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

### **Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** Through street outreach and a proven group level intervention (GLI), Street Smart, youth and young adults will increase knowledge and awareness of HIV and HCV. Other components of the GLI include: the Information, Motivation Enhancement and Skills Training, and Behavior Change (IMB) Model.

- **FTE Involved:** 0.50 FTE
- **Target Population:** At-risk youth and young adults
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban (Boulder, Denver, El Paso Counties)

14. **Grantee:** Hep C Connection  
**Project Title:** Replicating the Urban/Rural Partnership Reaching At-risk Populations

**Key Objectives:** Through this project, Hep C Connection plans to replicate their previous successful collaboration by offering the intervention in rural counties along the I-70 corridor. Hep C Connection will partner with Colorado AIDS Project – Western (CAP-W) for this project. CAP-W will reach at-risk populations in Garfield and Pitkin Counties, while Hep C Connection will reach at-risk populations in Summit and Eagle Counties. Based on research, these four counties have higher rates of HIV and HCV than almost any other rural counties in the state. The focus of the project is the provision of one-hour educational presentations at jails or re-entry facilities with free HIV and HCV testing.

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

**Request Summary**

**Strategies:** Through the educational presentations and the testing component, this project encompasses peer-to-peer group level intervention, individual level intervention, and Counseling, Testing, and Referral, and health education/risk reduction intervention. This project utilizes the health belief model, the stages of change model, and the diffusion of innovation model of behavioral theory.

- **FTE Involved:** 1.27 FTE
- **Target Population:** IDU and persons transitioning from incarceration or recently paroled aged 15 or older
- **Geographical Area Served:** Rural (Eagle, Garfield, Pitkin and Summit Counties)

15. **Grantee:** It Takes a Village  
**Project Title:** Jump Start

**Key Objectives:** Jump Start targets HIV negative or unknown serostatus African-American men who are in Denver/Aurora halfway houses, Denver county jail, Peer I (community corrections substance abuse treatment) and the pre-release centers in the Canon City, Colorado correctional complex.

- Sixty HIV negative (or unknown serostatus) African-American heterosexual men will be enrolled into the Project Start intervention while in correctional settings
- At least 40 HIV negative (or unknown serostatus) African-American heterosexual men will continue to participate in Project Start counseling sessions after they are released from incarceration
- At least 40 participants will attend Nia intervention group sessions after their release, where they will role-play safer behavior discussions, demonstrate condom use, and better understand the cultural dynamics in their relationships with women

- Eighty percent of participants will report increased condom use during vaginal and anal sex after completing the Nia intervention
- Advertise and promote the program at the Seventh Annual Freedom Conference, to men from halfway houses and work release programs

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

**Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** Jump Start HIV Prevention for African-American Men Transitioning from Incarceration will utilize two evidence-based HIV prevention interventions: Project Start is an HIV prevention risk-reduction program for people returning to the community after incarceration. Nia is a new diffusion of evidence-based behavioral interventions (DEBI) that offers a six-hour, video-based, small group level intervention which educates African-American men who have sex with women about HIV, its impact on the community, and condom use.
- **FTE Involved:** 1.2 FTE
- **Target Population:** African-American HIV negative or serostatus unknown men who have sex with women, transitioning from incarceration or recently paroled
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban (Adams, Arapahoe, Denver, Fremont, and Jefferson Counties)

**16. Grantee:** It Takes a Village  
**Project Title:** Sisters in Spirit

**Key Objectives:** Sisters in Spirit proposes to recruit 15 Popular Opinion Leaders (POLs), who will reach at least 10 women per month (starting two months after project start) or 110 per year, for a total of 1,650 women reached within their social networks. Outreach episodes will consist of conversations to assess HIV risk, prevention messages, and referrals for services that reduce barriers to prevention or increase access to testing and/or HIV services. POLs will engage in conversations with different friends and acquaintances among whom they are popular and trusted in order to bring about behavior change.

**Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** This project is based on the Popular Opinion Leader (POL) intervention
- **FTE Involved:** 2.95 FTE
- **Target Population:** African-American women, including transgender women
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban (Adams, Arapahoe, Denver, and Jefferson Counties)

**17. Grantee:** The Council on Substance Abuse and Mental Health  
**Project Title:** Holistic Health Recovery Program (HHRP)

**Key Objectives:** Outcomes include abstinence from illicit drug use or from sexual risk behaviors, reduced drug use, reduced risk for HIV transmission, and improved medical, psychological, and social functioning. The new Mile High Recovery Project, including flagship

HHRP program, will become an integral component of The Council's array of comprehensive, specialized, evidence-based outreach, prevention and treatment programs, focusing on IDUs.

- **Strategies:** This project is based on the Holistic Health Recovery Program (HHRP) intervention
- **FTE Involved:** 1.53 FTE

**18. Grantee:** The Council on Substance Abuse and Mental Health  
**Project Title:** Mpowerment

**Key Objectives:** The objective of this project is to establish a community organizing process for diffusion of risk-reduction norms that support safer-sex behavior. Participants bring about community-wide change by carrying out a set of five integrated activities that convey safer sex as the norm. Activities include:

- Formal outreach
- Peer-led group meetings (formal structure two-hour meetings called M-Groups)
- Informal outreach (one-on-one risk-reduction conversations with friends and social networks)
- Special social events that recruit and engage members of the target population
- An ongoing publicity campaign (including local newspapers and other print media, printed program collateral, social media outlets and other program-identified publicity methods)

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

**Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** This project is based on the evidence-based intervention, Mpowerment
- **FTE Involved:** 1.7 FTE
- **Target Population:** High-risk MSM, aged 18 to 24
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban (Denver County)

**19. Grantee:** Pueblo City County Health Department (PCCHD)  
**Project Title:** PCCHD HIV and AIDS Prevention Program

**Key Objectives:** The objectives of this program are to reach at-risk youth (including homeless youth, adjudicated youth, and those with a history of STIs through rapid HIV testing, and one-on-one counseling to at-risk youth through the family planning clinic at PCCHD. In addition to HIV testing, this project will hold *Be Proud! Be Responsible!* classes in the community. It is expected that the youth served will:

- Increase their knowledge about HIV/AIDS, STDs
- Believe in the value of safer sex and abstinence

- Have confidence and be able to negotiate safer sex and use condoms correctly
- Reduce sexual risk behaviors
- Take pride in, and responsibility for choosing responsible sexual behaviors

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)

**Request Summary**

- **Strategies:** This project will be based upon the *Be Proud! Be Responsible!* Intervention, including aspects of Social-Cognitive Theory, the Theory of Reasoned Action, and the Theory of Planned Behavior
- **FTE Involved:** 0.60 FTE
- **Target Population:** At-risk youth in Pueblo County
- **Geographical Area Served:** Rural (Pueblo County)

**20. Grantee:** Sisters of Color United for Education  
**Project Title:** Mi Vida, Su Vida

**Key Objectives:** Mi Vida, Su Vida uses community outreach events and group and individual interventions to reach its target population. The program itself is a twelve-week intervention that provides participants with an opportunity to explore the personal barriers that prevent them from leading a healthy and productive lifestyle. Session content focuses on self-exploration through the lens of curriculum topics that include: cultural/gender pride, psycho-sexual development, basic anatomy, accurate facts and information on STIs, HIV/AIDS education, substance abuse, domestic violence, and assertiveness training.

- **Strategies:** This project will be based on a local adaptation of the Sisters Informing Sisters on Topics about AIDS (SISTA) curriculum

- **Target Population:** High-risk Women of Color and persons transitioning from incarceration or recently paroled
- **Geographical Area Served:** Urban (Adams, Arapahoe, Denver County, and the city of Walsenburg)

**21. Grantee:** The Empowerment Program  
**Project Title:** The Green Light Project

**Key Objectives:** The objectives of this program are to decrease the number of women who are infected with HIV; provide women with personal knowledge of their HIV status; provide women with skills in partner disclosure, effective condom and barrier use and safer injection drug use. The project focuses on screening for substance abuse, mental health, and trauma history, which if left untreated, are strong predictors of future HIV acquisition.

**Grant Period:** Three years (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2015)
