

Programs and Funding for Alternative Fuels and Infrastructure in Colorado



Funding for alternative fueling station infrastructure

- Statewide funding for publicly accessible CNG and LPG stations (up to \$500,000 per location for CNG)
- Statewide funding for electric vehicle corridor DC fast-charging stations (up to \$380,000 per location)

Funding for alternatively fueled public and private fleet vehicles, freight switchers and airport equipment

- Statewide funding for electric, CNG, LPG, and certain diesel vehicles (25% - 40% of total vehicle cost up to cap, scrappage required)
- 11 County Front Range funding (80% of incremental cost up to cap, no scrappage requirement)

Funding for electric vehicle charging stations (outside 7 County Denver Metro Area)

- Funding for Level II & DC fast charging stations for entities (Level II: \$9,000; DC fast-charging: \$30,000)
- CEO does not fund electric vehicles

Funding for charging stations and electric vehicles (inside 7 County Denver Metro Area)

- Funding for Level II & DC fast charging stations for entities (Level II: \$9,000; DC fast-charging: \$30,000)
- Funding for light duty electric vehicles for governments and non-profits (up to \$8,260 per vehicle)

Funding for transit buses through Consolidated Call for Capital Projects

- Statewide funding for electric, CNG, LPG, and diesel transit buses (up to 80% of capital purchases)
- Statewide funding for facility improvements and technical equipment

Funding for alternatively fueled vehicles and infrastructure for public fleets

- Funding for alternative fuel vehicles for public fleets outside 11 County Front Range (100% of incremental cost)
- Statewide funding for alternative fueling stations for public fleets (50% of project cost)

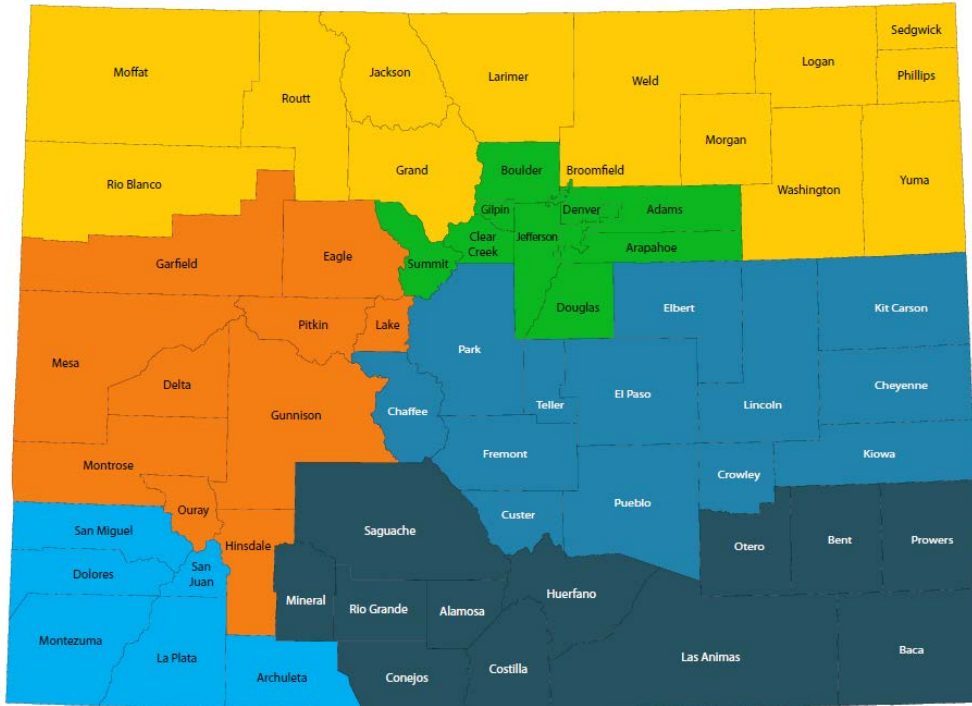

Innovative Motor Vehicle Tax Credits for purchase or lease of qualifying alternative fuel vehicles

- Light duty passenger vehicle (\$5,000*)
- Light duty truck (\$7,000*)
- Medium duty truck (\$10,000*)
- Heavy duty truck (\$20,000*)

Overview

Refuel coaches help fleets identify monetary savings and other advantages from converting to alternative fuels. The program also builds self-sustaining alternative fuel markets by working with community leaders, fuel providers, and dealerships. Refuel Colorado coaching is funded by the Colorado Energy Office and is available statewide.

Fleets

Refuel coaches help fleets calculate the life-cycle cost savings from switching to alternative fuel vehicles and provide technical guidance on issues like fueling or charging, maintenance, and safety. Coaches advise on what incentives apply to their vehicles or fueling infrastructure based on their location, vehicle class, fuel type, and whether the fleets are public or private.

Communities

Refuel coaches help businesses and government leaders understand the financial, environmental, economic development, and energy security advantages of promoting the use of alternative fuels. By working with an entire community, coaches create an ecosystem of broad support for a successful transition to alternatives fuels.
